

This licence is subject to the following conditions:

- Reporting Report is Due: It is mandatory that all licensees complete a Gaming Event Revenue Report within 90 days after an event has occurred and the license period expires, as outlined in Section 20.1 of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules. All Gaming Event Revenue Reports must be submitted online using the Gaming Online Service at: https://www.gaming.gov.bc.ca/licensing/reportListSearch.doA step-by-step guide for submitting a Gaming Event Revenue Report can be found on the GPEB website at https://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/sports-recreation-arts-and-culture/gambling/licences/egerr-guide.pdf
- This gaming event licence has been issued with the understanding that all advertising and marketing must comply with Section 17 of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules. Licensees must meet all advertising and marketing standards, which include ensuring promotional materials do not use minors to promote gambling, except as permitted in advertising using minors, are not directed primarily to minors, factually report the chances or odds of winning and include the gaming event licence number (e.g., BC Gaming Event Licence #123456).
- **Please be advised,** complete applications for a Class A or C licence may require up to 10 weeks to process once received by the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch, as outlined under Sections 5.1 and 5.3 of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules. Applications submitted with less than ten weeks to process may be at risk for not receiving their licence by the desired start date.
- A percentage-based prize must be calculated from the actual gross revenue generated through ticket sales and distributed to the winner as set out on this licence.
- The licensee has approval to use live streaming through Youtube as outlined in Section 10.1 Live Streaming of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules. Licensees are responsible for ensuring access to view the event is not restricted, the event is live streamed and not prerecorded, and a recording of the live stream is retained as part of their gaming records.
- This licence is approved with the understanding that events will be conducted and managed in compliance with Section 12 of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules.
- Section 86(2) of the Gaming Control Act (GCA) requires all licensees to notify GPEB's Investigations and Regional Operations division without delay regarding any conduct, activity or incident that may be considered contrary to the Criminal Code of Canada, the Gaming Control Act or Gaming Control Regulations, or that may affect the integrity of





gaming.

- The licensee has approval to use Online Ticket Sales, Online Ticket Distribution and Electronic Ticket Draw (RNG) systems using services provided by Trellis Social Enterprise.
- Class A online purchasing platforms must have a mechanism to ensure that purchasers of raffle tickets are 19 years of age or older and are located in BC as outlined in Section 12.4 of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules.
- Licensees utilizing the approved use of electronic ticket distribution must ensure that all tickets distributed include the information required as outlined in Section 12.2 for Multi-Day Ticket Raffles of the Licensed Charitable Gaming Rules.
